Forty Years

First there were conversations late at night that envisioned a different world—a better world filled with God's justice for the poor and marginalized. The conversations continued until the decision was made to put theory into action in a struggling neighborhood in a modestly-sized city.



In 1977, three couples and their four children took a leap of faith. They left the jobs and homes that they had and moved to Evansville, Indiana. They bought houses all within a block of each other. They worshiped together in their front rooms, met their neighbors, and planted gardens. They created a Covenant to bind themselves together and to set a vision for their activities.

They called themselves "Patchwork Central" to represent the multifaceted, many-dimensional personalities represented. Others joined the original three families. There were weddings and new babies. The group put down roots, first in a house in the neighborhood and then in the former Washington Avenue Temple building. They called this big, old building that was full of possibilities "The Meetinghouse".

They fought for their neighborhood's school, park, and pool. They raised their voices to protest utility rate increases that would hurt those living on low incomes. They baked bread, then turned this baking into a means through which to employ their neighbors. They provided medical care to some who needed it. They fed those who were hungry, provided housing for those who needed it, and nurtured children seeking care.

There were struggles: the massive fire that destroyed The Meetinghouse, scattering Patchwork's programming across the city for three years while they rebuilt; adjustments as Patchwork's founders moved on to other endeavors one by one; changes to the organization's management structure; deaths.

At times, some observed that the group was involved in as many ministries as there were stars in the heavens on a clear night. That the group should narrow its focus. And yet there was always space for someone with an idea and a passion to see that idea implemented and fruitful. Always, all kinds of people were welcomed.



And here we are today, celebrating forty years. The organization continues to grow and change. It is an accomplishment that we are proud of. While the Patchwork Community still gathers on Sunday evenings for worship and we are reliant on volunteers to get things done, now we have nine staff members and many programs that have outlasted their originators. Our neighbors see us and trust us as a neighborhood institution. Generations have found respect, support, assistance, and learning here.

We are still part of our neighborhood. The majority of our staff and key volunteers live within a mile of our building. Those who don't live nearby know multiple people who do. This still lends something special to the way Patchwork operates. This is our neighborhood. It's not a place that we drive across town to get to every morning and drive away from at the end of the day. It's not a place we come to only to provide a service or set up a program. We see our neighbor's struggles and they are our own. We are part of this neighborhood together.

Patchwork Central is born!




